So I did a quick little study...Do you realize how often God instituted something throughout the OT with provision for the children to ask the adults questions? Sometimes it says it was the reason he did it...like sometimes God asked them to do something consistently so that their children would ask questions and give them opportunity to retell the stories of God's mighty works! I just loved this picture of God intentionally setting up traditions to inspire questions just to create opportunities for us to talk about God, his character, his goodness, etc. So we can maybe even say, "I don't really know why he did this or commander this or didn't do it this way, but I know he is good, I know I can trust him, and I know I am eternally secure..."
